MARILYN ATWOOD AWARD







The Marilyn Atwood award is a District Eleven Award given out at Conference every year to recognize that one member in our District that goes above and beyond being an Altrusan. While we can't recognize and celebrate that special District Eleven Altrusan in person this year, she does need to be recognized.

The Marilyn Atwood award for 2019-2020 goes to Maria Hoffman, Altrusa International of Anaheim.

Maria has been an Altrusan since 2007. Since then Maria has gone way beyond embracing the Values of Altrusa.

She has held every board-level office in her Club, except Secretary. She was the 2nd VP for the 2008-2011 for the Anaheim Club's annual fundraiser. Maria creates the program, generates and manages the even tickets, creates seating charts, and annually donates up to \$2500 in auction gifts and prizes. She also collects and records all the money/transactions, counts all the income and makes the deposits. Her leadership and attention to detail has led to doubled profits and attendance, yet reduced costs!

Maria developed an expense reimbursement form, efficiency guidelines for subsequent Club Treasurers, and created auditing procedures.

Maria not only serves at the Club Level but she was the New Club Building District Eleven Chair assisting in workshops and adjudicating District awards. In 2016 the Anaheim Club hosted the 2016 District Eleven Conference where Maria was the co-chair, as well as, the Registration Chair and Conference Treasurer. She designed and made all the centerpieces, worked with catering.

In her "spare time" Maria averages 30 hours weekly babysitting, and volunteers on the Board of SCA Board; Teacher Cadre for the State Department of Education annual competitive event for high school students; and serving as a lector and Eucharistic minister for St. Martin de Porres and St. Boniface parishes.

Maria exemplifies the Altrusa Key: Amity, Loyalty, Talent, Reciprocity, Unity, Service and Achievement. No wonder her Club calls her the "Energizer Bunny!"

LETHA H. BROWN AWARD

The Letha H. Brown Literacy Award was established by the International Board of Directors in July 1993, to honor Past International President Letha H. Brown, who, in 1977, introduced literacy as a major emphasis of the organization. The goals are: to stimulate interest in developing active literacy projects to serve their community, to create an awareness of Altrusa and its commitment to literacy, to encourage members of local Clubs to participate actively in literacy projects designed to meet specific community needs, and to recognize outstanding Club achievement in service to the community.

The Oceano Library provides after school programs for children from the local elementary school and the South San Luis Obispo County Boys and Girls Club. We support the librarian in the after-school enrichment activities and programs that focus on arts and crafts, promoting thinking, listening

and visualization. Our club purchased the necessary supplies for the various projects and worked on the projects with the children. In addition, we partnered with the library to create "The Libromat" at a local laundromat where we monitor the use of the books and replenishing them as needed on a weekly basis.




Altrusa of Chula Vista for their project entitled "Reading and Celebrating at Mi Esquelita Pre-School." 1st Runner Up

We partnered with the South Bay Community Services which operates a therapeutic preschool, *Mi Escuelita*. The preschool provides services and early education for children, ages 3 – 5 years old, who have been affected by domestic violence. Our club provided Dr. Seuss books, donated by our fundraiser attendees and school supplies to the preschool. We celebrated *'Read Across America Day'* with the school along with our ASTRA Club members, attended graduation, and participated in a new classroom opening ceremony.



Altrusa of the West Valley for their project entitled "Recycling Science-Combining Science with Literacy and Art." 2nd Runner Up



Our club partnered with WHAM (What's Happenin'Art Movement) a locally based organization that provides arts and craft programs for children. Our goal was to hold a literacy project where 4th grade students could participate in literacy and have fun doing it. Our project based on the book "Earth Day Hooray" combined literacy with art and science. After reading the book, the children discussed the book and how they can keep the earth clean by recycling and what to do with the aluminum cans they collected. They used what they read to create art by painting the aluminum cans with recycling messages and took them home to share with family

Congratulations to Altrusa of The West Valley for their project entitled "Sleeping Mats for Homeless." Winner! Winner!

"We provided plastic shopping bags and donated our time to flatten, fold and cut the bags which then get tied together to create "plarn" (plastic yarn) to crochet into woven sleeping mats. This was in partnership with a local organization that creates the mats to be donated to homeless individuals and veterans in the Phoenix area."

Altrusa of San Luis Obispo County for their project entitled "Open Door Preschool Play Yard" 1st Runner Up



"We chose this project to take an active hand on role in helping to renovate the Open-Door Preschool (ODPS) play yard that was vandalized. The school enrolls children ages 2-5 years and serves a large proportion of low-income families. The student population includes disadvantaged students and English Learners. ODPS has been a community staple and provides an intensive early education experience that prepares students for academic success."

Altrusa of Anaheim for their project entitled "JOYA Scholars" 2nd Runner Up

"JOYA partners with Altrusa International of Anaheim to support low-income junior and high school students and the working-class families in their quest for higher education. The program assists students through one-on-one mentoring, academic tutoring, educational workshops, parent academy, campus visits, SAT preparation materials, classes, and college scholarships. With these activities, JOYA and Altrusa volunteers fill a relational and knowledge gap in a system that can be daunting to navigate."

Altrusa International Foundation – Day of Giving – June 20, 2020

The COVID 19 has caused all Altrusa Districts, except one, to cancel their District Conferences. Conferences are the primary fundraisers for the Altrusa International Foundation. The Foundation Board of Trustees has declared June 20th to be "ALTRUSA INTENATIONAL FOUNDATION DAY of GIVING". The board agreed to offer two \$1500 prizes: one to the club that contributes the largest donation, and one to the club contributing the largest donation based on membership per capita, so smaller clubs have a chance. How to Create a Zoom account on your mobile device

The sign-up process for Zoom in the mobile app on iPhone, Android, or iPad looks the same.

- Download the app from the App Store or Play Store Tap to Open it
- Tap "Sign Up" on the Welcome Page
- The other options are "Sign In" if you already have an account or
- "Join a Meeting" (if you were sent a meeting ID via email or text.
- Enter the email address that you'd like to use for this account, followed by your first and last name.
- Check the box next to "I agree to the Terms of Service."
- Tap "Sign Up" in the top-right corner.
- A pop-up will appear informing you that a confirmation email was sent to the email address you chose. Tap "OK" to close the pop-up and open your preferred email app to check your inbox.
- Tap to open the message in your inbox. Scroll and tap the blue "Activate Account" option. This will open the browser on your phone or tablet.
- Begin the first step of confirming your account information and choosing a password. Re-enter your first and last name. Type a password and then retype the same password to confirm.
- If your password does not meet Zoom's requirements, instructions will appear. For example, the password must include at least eight characters and at least one letter and number.
- The second step will prompt you to invite colleagues to a meeting now. If you're in a hurry to do so, you can complete this step, but if you're simply setting up your account to use in the future, opt to skip instead.
- The third step encourages you to start a meeting now.
 Again, you can skip this step by tapping "Go to My Account."

How to make a Zoom account on your PC

Signing up for Zoom looks similar on your desktop, though it may be even easier to complete the required steps on your browser.

While you can use the Zoom platform through your browser, it may be helpful to download the app so you can access it whenever you'd like if you plan to use Zoom often for work-related calls.

Virtual Meetings – An Easy Alternative to the Real Thing

"To Zoom or Not to Zoom - that is the question" -

The coronavirus pandemic is forcing clubs to have meetings from home who have never done so before. Many newly sequestered Altrusans are encountering technology they've never used before--like Zoom for virtual meetings. A Zoom meeting allows your club to meet virtually. The Zoom App or Zoom on your PC or Mac is free but meetings are limited to 40 minutes. The Club President or an appointee can schedule the meeting and invite all of the club members. If the meeting will take longer than 40 minutes then schedule two back to back meetings. For example, schedule one meeting for 7:00pm and a second meeting for 7:50 pm. This time delay will allow your club members to take a bathroom break and refill their glass with their favorite beverage. Another alternative is to order a little mini refrigerator from Amazon and once it is delivered, set it up next to your computer and fill it with your favorite beverages.

New software is always scary to most Altrusans so I have come up with step by step instructions for downloading zoom, hosting a zoom meeting and joining a zoom meeting.

You will need speakers and a camera. To set up your speakers, in the bottom right hand corner of your PC, select the Windows ICON. Little icons appear on the left side and the one that looks like a gear is for your settings.

- > Choose "sound."
- > select Speakers/Headset as your output device
- > select microphone as your sound input device.
- > Click the X in the top right hand corner to exit out of settings.

You will need speakers and a camera. To set up your speakers, in the bottom right hand corner of your PC, select the Windows ICON.

- Scroll down to the camera app
- Select it
- Click on the camera icon appears
- You should see yourself

You are now ready for Zoom. Please follow my step by step instructions for download Zoom or your phone or PC. Creating a Zoom account and finally hosting or joining a meeting.

We also initiated six new members. Welcome to: Lina Cestero, Ayarim De Anda, Kathy Lightbody, Helen Nosal, and Norma Parra.





- At the end of this membership year, 2019-2020 they had 12 members. Fifteen members are needed for them to Charter.


COMMUNICATIONS Katharine Raley
